- 9. Have you spent time every day learning about your faith and reading Sacred Scripture?
- 10. Have you engaged in sexual activity outside of marriage...Have you engaged in homosexual acts or masturbation?
- 11. Have you had impure thoughts?
- 12. Have you looked at or engaged in pornography?
- 13. Have you talked about others unkindly or gossiped...Have you listened to others who have spoken unkindly or gossiped?
- 14. Have you engaged in excessive behaviors and habits (eating, drinking, smoking, etc.) and consume more than what you need?
- 15. Are you attached to or preoccupied with your electronic devices (computers, cell phones, iPads, iPods, etc.) with games, texts, emails, etc. And are you overly attached to social media, consuming time that you could otherwise be connecting with God?
- 16. Have you stolen anything including time from your employer?
- 17. Have you dressed provocatively... have you come to Mass dressed appropriately?
- 18. Have you contributed to the Church, cared for the poor, the lonely, and the sick?
- 19. Have you shown respect to your parents, your spouse, your priest and those in authority over you?
- 20. Have you lied or cheated?

How to Go to Confession

- 1. Enter the confessional and make the Sign of the Cross. The priest will usually initiate this.
- Say, "Bless me Father for I have sinned it's been (state how much time has

- 3. Name your sins and the number of times you have committed them. Keep this very brief. The priest will ask for details if necessary. This is not a counseling session. If you need more time with the priest, make an appointment for him to hear your confession.

- 5. The priest may address your sins, and will ususally give you penance.
- 6. The priest will ask you to make an Act of Contrition. Below is one version of this prayer:
 - O my God, I am heartily sorry for having offended you, and I detest all my sins, because I dread the loss of heaven and the pains of hell; but most of all because they offend you, my God, who are all good and deserving of all my love. Things nice to know about going to confession:
